IU will connect your school with a dedicated IU-ICC coordinator from the nearest supporting IU campus. They will help you review your college-level offerings to see how close you are to delivering the ICC.

YOUR IU-ICC COORDINATOR WILL:


- 1. Identify IU and non-IU dual credit offerings at your high school.

- 3. Map these findings to ICC competency areas.




STEP 2 COMPLETE YOUR PLAN

DO THE OFFERINGS AT YOUR HIGH SCHOOL MEET THE REQUIREMENTS?

To earn the ICC, students must complete 30 credit hours of college-level coursework in six competencies, 15 of which are earned through a primary postsecondary partner like IU.

STEP 3 DEPLOY AND DOCUMENT

CURRICULUM MAP COMPLETE? YOU'RE READY TO LAUNCH!

Your final step is to sign a memorandum of understanding (MOU) designating Indiana University as your primary postsecondary ICC partner.

The MOU outlines the responsibilities of your high school as a delivery site for the ICC and the responsibilities of IU as your primary postsecondary partner.

MOU KEY POINTS

YOUR SCHOOL WILL:

- Agree that students earn at least 15 credit hours of the ICC courses through IU.
- Share information about students and their progress pursuing the ICC.
- Guide students to submit exam scores and transcripts to IU for all non-IU dual credit.

IU WILL:

- ♣ Chart a path for students to complete the ICC with IU and non-IU credits.
- Empower students to complete the ICC through strategic course planning.
- Verify credit attainment and award the ICC certificate to all successful students.

TEACHER CREDENTIALING

The Advance College Project (ACP) equips educators to teach college-level courses in high school classrooms. We ensure they can deliver rigorous academic content, are adept at postsecondary pedagogies, and can enhance your students' college readiness.

THE IU DUAL CREDIT PIPELINE

Instructors in the IU Dual Credit Pipeline take tuition-free IU graduate courses while teaching ACP courses. The Pipeline combines IU graduate coursework with ongoing support that meets expectations of the IU on-campus department and the Higher Learning Commission.

Instructors in the IU Dual Credit Pipeline are eligible to teach an IU dual credit course while simultaneously earning their graduate certificate or master's degree.

ACP INSTRUCTORS RECEIVE:

- → Professional development opportunities through IU campuses.
- → Stipends to purchase books and materials to assist in teaching.
- → Access to the full spectrum of IU resources including libraries, databases, and the Canvas learning management system.
- → The credentials dual credit teachers need to teach as IU adjunct faculty.
